PARKING

From the UT Visitors' Center, turn right onto Neyland Drive. Turn left at the second traffic light onto Joe Johnson Drive and continue through the campus of the College of Agricultural Sciences & Natural Resources. Turn right at the second light onto Volunteer Boulevard. Continue on Volunteer Boulevard, including two large curves to the left, through the main campus to Cumberland Avenue and turn right at the light. Continue east on Cumberland Avenue for one block and turn right onto Philip Fulmer Way. The parking garage is just beyond the University Center. Turn right into the garage and park.

From the Office of Undergraduate Admissions, continue on Circle Park Drive, past Peyton Manning Pass, and turn right onto Volunteer Boulevard. Continue straight through the traffic light at Andy Holt Avenue to Cumberland Avenue, and turn right. At the next traffic light, turn right onto Philip Fulmer Way. The parking garage is just beyond the University Center. Turn right into the garage and park.

WALKING

Exit the University Center garage onto Philip Fulmer Way and turn right toward Neyland Stadium. On your right, you will see a row of ATMs, known by students as the "Money Wall." Continue along the Money Wall to the street intersection, and turn right. Continue one block to the top of the hill. To your right is the Haslam Business Complex Administration Complex. To the right, beyond the CBA Complex, is the Stokely Management Center. These two buildings house the College of Business Administration.

At the intersection of Andy Holt Avenue and Volunteer Boulevard, the building ahead on the right is John C. Hodges Library, the largest of the five libraries located on campus. Cross Volunteer Boulevard and enter the library. The bottom floor contains UT's extensive map collection and a circulation desk. Proceed up two flights of stairs to the second floor. This section of the library contains "The Commons" and is popular because it is open late each day and has ample space to meet with study groups, practice a presentation, or use one of the library's desktop computers. Students in need of a laptop computer may check one out at the Commons for use in the library. As you continue down the hallway toward the upper level exit, you will see two other reasons this floor of the library is so popular with students – Starbucks

Coffee and a convenience store. Hodges Library contains more than 3 million holdings, including books (located on floors 3-6), periodicals, microfilm, electronic media, and maps.

Exit the library on the second floor and continue straight ahead along Melrose Avenue. The building on the left is Melrose Hall. This former residence hall is now a multifunctional building containing offices of the Center for International Education, which arranges study abroad programs, the Chancellor's Honors Program, the LGBT & Allies Outreach Center, and music performance studios. The Honors Program provides distinctive curricular and research opportunities to many of UT's top students.

Ahead on the left is Hess Hall, the second-largest residence hall on campus, housing over 900 men and women in separate wings. Hess has both single and double occupancy rooms and community bathrooms on each floor. It features a TV lounge, kitchens, exercise equipment, a computer room, fast food, and a branch of the UT Book & Supply Store.

Across the parking lot to the right is the International House, a cultural gathering place for all students. Cross the street just beyond Hess Hall and continue on Melrose Avenue. The building on the left is the Black Cultural Center. Open to all students, this building houses the Office of Minority Student Affairs, which offers three very helpful programs: tutoring, a book loan program, and the Early Alert program (similar to progress reports of high schools).

Continue on Melrose Avenue and you will pass several houses across the street on the right belonging to religious organizations on campus. On the left, is Hopecote, UT's official guest house for VIP's.

Across the street from Hopecote is the Student Success Center (SSC). The center is a principal source of academic support and referral for students, including tutoring and academic exchange programs. Each year, more programs are added, and the Center underscores UT's commitment to help all students succeed.

As you reach the end of the street where it turns to the left, continue walking straight ahead. To the left is a pole with a blue light on top – one of the 100+ emergency phones across campus. The red button on the box is for emergencies, summoning the police directly to that location. The black button calls for an escort van for a safe ride anywhere on campus.

Continue straight past the emergency phone to the Presidential Complex. The Presidential Court Building on your left includes a cafeteria, food court, a bakery, and two convenience stores. Walk into the courtyard and you will be able to see the four identically-furnished, suite-style residence halls that make up the complex: Humes and South Carrick (women), North Carrick and Reese (men).

Walk diagonally to the left, across the courtyard and down the steps between South Carrick and Humes Halls. Ahead on the right is Morrill Hall, another suite-style residence hall that contains Freshman Learning Communities for students in Architecture & Design, Engineering, Public Policy, Leadership, and the Chancellor's Honors Program. Continue past Morrill Hall and cross 20<sup>th</sup> Street. Turn left and cross Andy Holt Avenue at the intersection. Andy Holt Avenue continues to your right, over a bridge to the West Campus, home to the College of Agricultural Sciences & Natural Resources, the College of Veterinary Medicine, and the UT Gardens.

To your right is the Student Aquatic Center. Walk toward the Aquatic Center, continue along its east side, and turn right. You are welcome to go into the lobby to your right and look around. The center includes indoor and outdoor Olympic-size pools and a fitness facility.

Turn back along the sidewalk and turn right. Walk across the patio area to the Tennessee Recreation Center for Students (T-RECS). Enter T-RECS and visit the lobby area. You can look down into the cardio area and through the glass doors into the basketball courts. The equipment and courts are available for use by UT students. Take the stairway beyond the vending machines down to the lower level. Exit through the doors at the bottom of the steps and turn left onto the sidewalk. Continue east along Volunteer Boulevard.

Look across Volunteer Boulevard to the right to see Fraternity Park, home to 13 of the 22 fraternities on campus. To the left are the Intramural Fields, LaPorte Stadium, and Tom Black Track. Behind the stadium and track is the Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Building (HPER), which includes a swimming pool, weight room, climbing wall, classrooms, offices, four gymnasiums, and other facilities available for student use. Continue on the sidewalk bordering the stadium to the intersection of Volunteer Boulevard and Pat Head Summitt Street, named for the Lady Vols basketball coach, the winningest coach in NCAA history.

To the right, across Volunteer Boulevard is the new Student Health Center, which will open in the summer of 2011, offering a wide range of medical and counseling services. Straight ahead is "The Rock," the only place on campus where graffiti are permitted. Diagonally to the right,

across the intersection is the Stokely Athletic Center, home to the Army and Air Force ROTC programs, and Dance Marathon, UT's annual philanthropic event that raises money for the East Tennessee Children's Hospital.

Continue along Volunteer Boulevard, and cross Pat Head Summitt Street. The construction site to your left is the future site of the Natalie Haslam Music Building, the new home of the Pride of the Southland Marching Band and the School of Music. The building will include many studios and an auditorium for student and professional performances.

Just beyond the Music Building, take the sidewalk that angles to the left and enter the Art and Architecture Building (A&A). Walk straight through the open atrium to the far side and note the many modern architectural features. This building also has a UT bookstore branch as well as a snack shop. A&A offers studio space to art students, and as you pass through, look to your right to see the exhibits currently on display at the Ewing Gallery.

When you exit A&A, go up the stairs directly in front of the exit and turn left. Continue on the sidewalk to the small plaza on the left. On the right side is the Humanities & Social Sciences Building (HSS), which houses many of UT's classrooms. On the left are Carousel Theatre, a theater in the round, and Clarence Brown Theatre, UT's proscenium theater, which hosts both professional and student productions throughout the year.

Continue directly ahead and turn right on the Joe Johnson & John Ward Pedestrian Walkway. The walkway is composed of engraved stones that highlight more than 200 years of UT history. When you are through viewing the walkway, continue down the hill toward the traffic light, but turn right immediately past the amphitheatre (on your right) and continue along the sidewalk and down the steps toward the HSS building.

Walk between HSS and the McClung Tower, which houses faculty offices, where professors have open-door office hours every week. Also finding their homes in the HSS Building are the Writing and Language Labs, where students receive tutoring in writing and foreign languages. Continue on the sidewalk with HSS at your right, past the humanities plaza and fountain and the Council Circle, an outdoor class and study feature on your left.

When you reach Volunteer Boulevard, cross the street to the entrance of Circle Park Drive and turn left, walking toward the Torchbearer Statue.

Pause for a few moments in front of the Torchbearer Statue. The Statue is one of the most easily recognized landmarks on campus and is a symbol of UT. The inscription at the base of the statue reflects the University's ideals of scholarship and service.

Continue through Circle Park, on the brick walkway directly behind the Torchbearer Statue. At the end of the walkway, cross Circle Park Drive. To your right you will see the Student Services Building (SSB). You may wish to visit one or more of the following offices located there:

Undergraduate Admissions	Room 320 (street level)

To your far right is McClung Museum, a Smithsonian Institution affiliate that presents both permanent and traveling exhibits free of charge.

To your left, you will see the Communication Building, home to the College of Communication & Information, the daily campus newspaper, *The Daily Beacon*, the *Volunteer* yearbook, *Phoenix* literary magazine, two radio stations, and a television station, all of which are student-run.

Continue to walk to your left until you reach the end of Circle Park Drive. Cross Peyton Manning Pass and look to the right. You will see Neyland Stadium, one of the largest collegiate football stadiums in the nation. Attending a Vols home football game is truly a remarkable experience to share with more than 100,000 orange-clad fans.

Continue left along Peyton Manning Pass toward Volunteer Boulevard, and turn right. At the corner with Volunteer Boulevard, is the College of Nursing, which has a rich history of preparing its students extremely well for professional licensure and careers.

Continue along Volunteer Boulevard. Just beyond the College of Nursing are the Bailey Education Complex and the Claxton Building, which house the College of Education, Health & Human Sciences. The college's many degree programs, including a five-year teaching program that combines a bachelor's degree in a subject area and a master's degree in education, with a year of in-classroom experience.

At the next intersection, turn right onto Andy Holt Avenue, walk down the hill for one block. Ahead and to the right is the Alumni Memorial Building, which houses some of UT's newest high-tech classrooms and Cox Auditorium, a world-class performance facility and lecture hall. In front

of the building, on Philip Fulmer Way, is the Transportation Plaza, where students can catch free shuttles to points around campus and the City of Knoxville's free trolleys to downtown events.

Turn left, cross Andy Holt Avenue and return to the money wall and parking garage. This concludes the regular tour route and you may continue to your car at the University Center Garage.

Please consider extending your visit to see the Carolyn P. Brown Memorial University Center, a hub of student life at UT, located just beyond the parking garage. You are encouraged to walk into the University Center where, on the first floor there are two dining areas, a ticket office, a post office, and the UT Bookstore. Take a look around in the bookstore if you have time—*Go Big Orange!* On the second floor, you will find a large auditorium, ballroom, computer store, snack shop, and meeting rooms.

If you would like to see "The Hill," take the steps to your left at the corner of Phillip Fulmer and Andy Holt Boulevard, and follow them to the top, or take the second floor walkway over Philip Fulmer Drive from the University Center. At the top of the steps and across the street is Ayres Hall, with its bell tower (music played at 5:00 daily), the signature building of UT Knoxville and home to the mathematics department and College of Arts & Sciences. If you look at the top of the tower, you will see the familiar checkerboard theme that is carried over to the end zones of Neyland Stadium. Also located on the Hill are buildings housing: the departments of Biology, Physics, Chemistry, Psychology, Earth & Planetary Sciences, and Geography, as well as the College of Engineering. If you turn right on the sidewalk at the top of the steps and continue past Hesler Biology, Nielsen Physics, Earth & Planetary Sciences, and Dabney-Buehler, you will see a beautiful view of the downtown Knoxville skyline and the World's Fair Park.
